Priest:

In our liturgical cycle we are back to Ordinary Time. Today Jesus helps us to deepen our relationship with the loving Father in heaven.

Reader:

An earthly father would grant his son whatever he asks for: We pray for confidence to ask for the gifts we need, knowing that our prayers will be answered.

Lord in your mercy.

Today is father's day: We pray that God will bless our fathers, those living and those who have passed away.

Lord in your mercy.

Many people are now suffering economically because of the Coronavirus lockdown: Let us ask the Lord to help us to recover swiftly.

Lord in your mercy.

Many of our children and grandchildren are now back in education: We ask the loving Father to keep them in his special care.

Lord in your mercy.

We commend to the loving mercy of the Father in heaven those who have died recently, especially Maureen Golding. We also pray and those whose anniversaries occur at about this time: May they enjoy communion with all the saints in heaven.

Lord in your mercy.

The Father knows our innermost secrets. Let us share with him all of our hopes and all of our fears.

[After a pause]

Lord in your mercy.

Mary taught Jesus how to trust in God. We can ask her to intercede on our behalf.

Hail Mary....

Priest: Father, we thank you for the gift of your Son, who we encounter everyday of our lives. We make these prayers in his name because he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever.

Reflection for the 12th Sunday of Ordinary Time

Sunday, 21st June 2020

Today is Father's day. It is the day we choose to honour our earthly fathers. Dads don't get as big a deal as mums do, but let us find some way of remembering them in prayer today.

Alas, we know very little about the relationship between Jesus and his father, Joseph. However, we can make some deductions from what we do know. Jesus was trained by his father to be a carpenter and was able to take over the family business when Joseph died, and in this way he was able to support his mother.

Perhaps the most significant fact that opens up this relationship for us is the choice of word Jesus uses to describe God. The Hebrew word for "father" is "ab", but Jesus chose to call God by the diminutive of this word, "abba", which we would translate in English as "daddy". Jesus teaches us that we are loved by our Father in heaven in a similar way to the love we receive from our earthly dads. They provide for us and make sure we are brought up in a respectful way. The use of this word was unique to Jesus. In the Old Testament God is: "I am who I am", or "the one" or simply "Lord". Jesus is the first to call God "daddy" marking the familiarity of the relationship he felt towards God.

In the gospel today Matthew has collected together a number of sayings of Jesus which reflect his teaching on who the Father is. To begin with, God is our security. As a child feels secure being protected by his dad, so we should never let ourselves be overcome with fear. We have a deeply concerned protective figure in the Father in heaven. We hear children boast: "My dad is bigger than your dad!" Well no one is bigger than the Father in heaven.

Then Jesus goes on to describe how we are known by our Father in heaven. He knows every single little detail of our lives. Even the hairs on our head are counted. The Father in heaven feels for a worthless sparrow that falls to the ground: How much more is his concern for us who are made in his image?

Sometimes parents unwittingly distort the aspect of God's ever present concern for us. Perhaps we hear an exasperated parent warn: "Don't do that, darling, remember God is always watching you". But the Father's concern is not censorious, rather it is intimate and loving. We should never have the feeling that God is there trying to catch us out when we do something wrong. No, he is there to help and support us. Yes, indeed the Father does know all of our secrets, but not so that he can expose us and embarrass us, but so that he can love us intimately.

Jesus knew that he would have to suffer grievously at the hands of those incapable of comprehending his message, and that sadly too, many of his followers would suffer the same fate. Many Christians in the early Church were destined to witness to Jesus by being persecuted by others who could not accept the reality of the gospel being preached. So Jesus declares that the Father is definitely on the side of those who make Jesus their friend, and will come to their assistance. Alas, those who reject that friendship will not enjoy similar acceptance from the Father.

Of the Old Testament prophets, the one who had the hardest time of all was Jeremiah. Not his fault. At the time he lived, Israel was about to fall. It was the job of the prophet to explain that their current predicament was the fault of their own actions. This did not exactly make him flavour of the month. Despite the unpopularity of his message, Jeremiah feels close to God. In the first reading he is aware of how God is personally able to deliver him from the machinations of those who want to do him harm. He is not able to call God "Father", but he is aware of his father-like care for him.

Nowadays we have become so used to calling God "Father" that we tend to use the simile the other way around. God is the true Father, and our earthly fathers need to be like who we think God is. Not all of our earthly fathers are able to live up to these high expectations! Nevertheless, today is the day we celebrate fatherhood and today is the day we have the opportunity to pray for our dads. *May God bless them all!*

Prayers Please

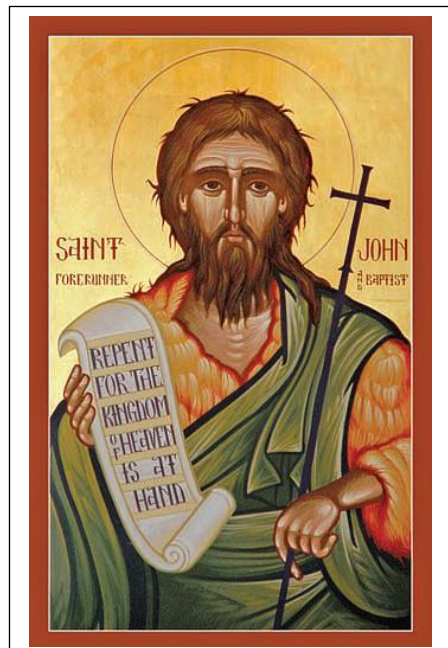
