

## Reflection for the 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter

### Sunday, 17<sup>th</sup> May 2020

John Grisham is a very talented author. Most of his books involve a lawyer as the hero who comes to the assistance of someone on the margins of society who is seeking justice. By skilled questioning, the truth is uncovered and the innocence of the underdog is established. In many of his novels a bond of friendship develops between the legal expert and the person he is seeking to help. With lots of twists and turns in the plot, we are kept on the edge of our seats until the final chapter, where right wins out over wrong.

In today's gospel, Jesus promises the disciples at the last supper that he will send an "Advocate" to be their counsellor and to be their friend. The Holy Spirit will be with them, replacing Jesus, so that they are not left as orphans. The disciples had to wait until Pentecost Sunday before they could understand these words of Jesus, and only in their mission during the years that followed, would they come to realise what a friend the Holy Spirit would be to them.

However, there is a key difference between the stories of John Grisham and the way we experience the Holy Spirit in our lives. In his plots, the underdog, who is falsely accused, is, in fact, innocent and it only remains for the good lawyer to establish this fact. If it were the case that the accused was after all guilty, then the story would not work at all.

In our case, the Father sends us the Holy Spirit to be our defender, even though we are guilty. Yes, we all take part in the sinfulness of the human condition. It was precisely because of this that the Father sent us his only begotten Son, so that we might be forgiven. When Jesus breathed on the disciples and told them to receive the Holy Spirit, and in this way he gave them power, in turn, to forgive others. Bringing forgiveness is part and parcel of who God is, it is what he does. We are the ones who sin, God is the one who wants those sins to be forgiven. In the realisation that we are forgiven, even though we don't deserve it, we can begin to fathom the love which is the glue that keeps God in being. By accepting what the Spirit does for us, we can become part of that ceaseless cycle of being loved and loving.

During this week the government has cautiously removed some of the restrictions designed to keep the Covid-19 virus at bay. We still do not know when churches will reopen or when we shall be able to gather as a community of prayer and praise. When we do come together again, the gifts of the Holy Spirit will be key. It is through the Holy Spirit that we learn to put the scars of sin aside and begin to see the bigger picture, as God sees it. With the friendship of the Spirit, we can begin to hope again.

In our society today, many people are passionate about many issues. Our politicians are continually being lobbied with people trying to promote one course of action over another. Even in our parish council meetings, different points of view are expressed, sometimes quite vehemently. Alas, when I believe something so strongly, I become deaf to other arguments and blind to other courses of action. This is precisely where the Holy Spirit comes in.

To make a good decision, I need the gift of indifference. I need to be able to understand the opposing point of view, and even be prepared to accept it if this is what God is inviting me to do. When we can learn to put aside the stubbornly held beliefs which we cling to, we can begin to open ourselves to a world much deeper and wider than the one we currently inhabit.

After the threat of this virus is passed we will need to come together and work for a new world order. We are being challenged to work out what our real priorities are. We can open our hearts to receiving the promptings of the Advocate, sent by God to defend us, sent by God to be our friend, but sent by God to show us how we can make his creation something he would be proud of. With the gifts of courage and imagination we can build a new church, a new country and a new world order. Let us pray for these gifts.
