# From the Headmaster

The world news this week has been dominated by the Inauguration of the President of the United States. This has led me to reflect on leadership and responsibility. I was fascinated that one of the prayers used was composed by Archbishop John Carroll for the inauguration of George Washington. John Carroll, his brother and cousin, were educated by the Jesuits in St Omers, now Stonyhurst, in the 1750s. How amazing to be able to follow a 'golden thread' from Stonyhurst to the White House at this time of global challenge.

I am a musician and one of my favourite classical pieces is Belshazzar's Feast by William Walton. The Oratorio tells the story of the Old Testament King using an enormous choir and orchestra including four spatially separated brass bands. Belshazzar behaves blasphemously and there is a very dramatic moment when God writes a message on a wall saying to the King 'you have been weighed, measured and found wanting'. The line is also quoted in the well-known Heath Ledger film 'The Knight's Tale' which tells the story of a young man wanting to be judged worthy to be a Knight.

As a society we are preoccupied with weights and measures, with counting value. One of the debates around Brexit was whether we can use Imperial or Metric measurement. You may have a wall at home where you compare the different heights of family members in inches or centimetres. Your ingredients for the Great Stonyhurst Bake Off may be weighed in ounces or grams?





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# From the Headmaster

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In a Jesuit school the phrase 'you have been weighed, measured and found wanting' means so much more than mere academic measurement. Of course, we want young people to make excellent progress academically, but also to develop their co-curricular interests, their sport and to have a cultural hinterland. Above all Jesuit schools are about being 'big hearted'. Being a compassionate and generous person.

So my reflection for the week is for everyone to reflect on how we develop all the areas of our lives. To ensure that we value not only what can be weighed and measured and counted but also the less tangible values that make good men and women for others. Let us ensure that we are a community full of the big-hearted and pray that we are not 'found wanting'.

What a feast! I'm sure William the Conqueror and his barons would be fighting each other to get the first slice.

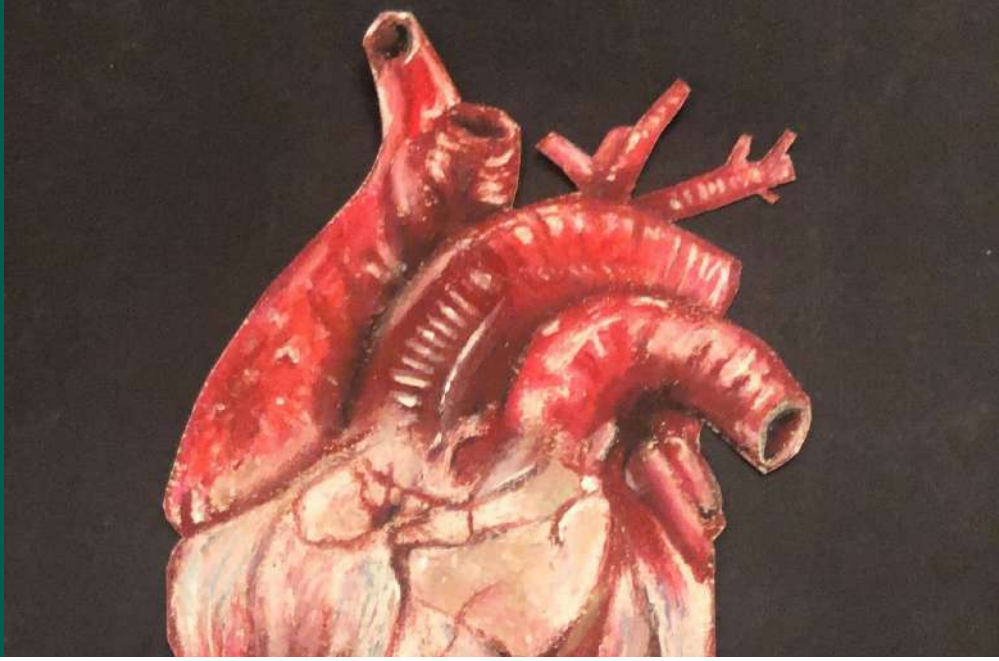

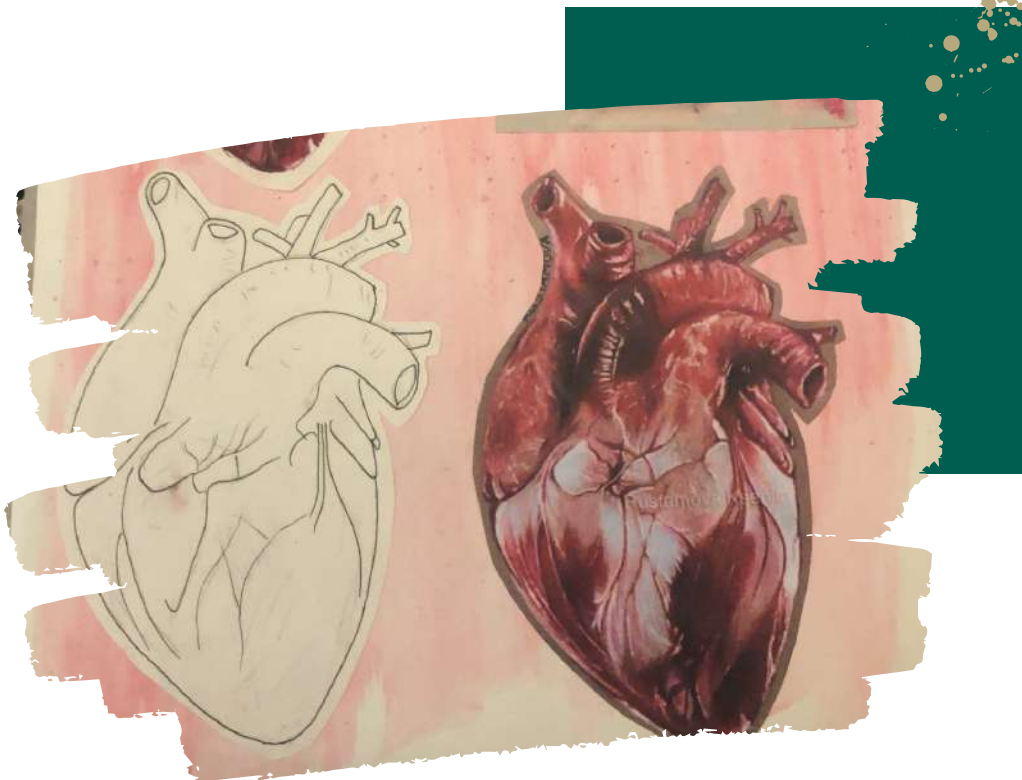
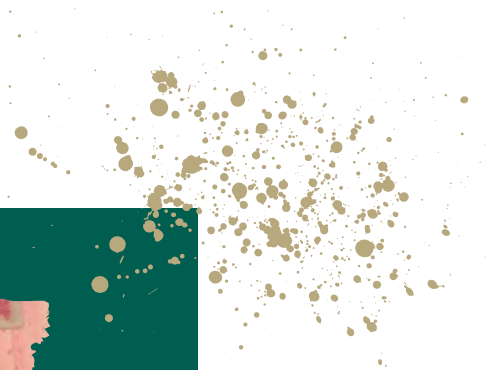


## Artist in the Making

## British Culture

To encompass the development of the imaginative and creative dimension of pupils, there is a new initiative in the English as an Additional Language Department, focusing on British culture. Mrs Addy's Lower Line pupils are learning about different aspects of art, gastronomy, music and traditions. This week the pupils have been studying William Morris, an Oxford scholar who was a designer, printer, poet, weaver and architectural preservationist. He designed patterns inspired by British flora and fauna and drew inspiration from the British countryside, characterising his patterns with foliage. Morris' work included stained glass windows, furniture, wall hangings and tapestries.

The pupils researched different designs, then were set the challenge of creating their own this week, incorporating flora and fauna found around the Ribble Valley, many of which are found in the Bowland AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) such as roe deer and hen harriers.

We are looking forward to seeing their creations!

## Drama Monologues

As an alternative to our usual co-curricular this term, the Drama Department has launched a 'monologue challenge' for pupils across the school with the first entries arriving this week. Drama is an expressive art form and not a competitive subject, so the Drama Department did not want pupils to feel they were being judged when creating these monologues.

The task is for pupils to choose a monologue (from film, television, the stage, script, radio, stories etc.) and bring the performance to life for their audience. A PowerPoint presentation has been emailed to all drama pupils this week, with drama scholars being the first to be invited. We hope to have a wide variety of entries by the end of the half-term, the first entry was by one of our talented Poets, India (Drama Scholar) and is taken from Mike Bartlett's 2015 play, Bull.

It is hoped that these monologues can be shared with the wider Stonyhurst community, to serve as a reminder of the talented and creative individuals that Stonyhurst has waiting in the wings...



"The play centres around three characters who are waiting in anticipation outside their boss's office to see which one of them is going to be fired. The play is described as portraying the 'fine line between office politics and playground bullying', and in this scene my character Isobel, a master of manipulation and subtle intimidation, singles out the weak link of the group, Thomas, and belittles and chips away at his character.

Firstly, she aims to destroy his confidence by suggesting that everyone around him had no doubt in their mind that he was destined to failure, everyone including his ex-wife and young son. Secondly, she suggests that whatever little confidence he had was founded on the wrong idea about how life works."

## Line Competitions Live On

The co-curricular life of the College seems as busy as ever! Between online competitions, academic extension opportunities as well as the usual range of clubs and societies which have moved into the virtual world, pupils are keeping fully engaged with all that a Stonyhurst education affords.

Not least is the support being offered to pupils to stay active during the dark days of January. The Games Department has provided a raft of sport-specific materials for pupils to engage with and Mr Evans ( Head of PE) has created a series of guided videos that pupils can tune into each week. The Line Competition also invites pupils to record their running, through the Strava app, to keep alive the competitive spirit that is at the heart of the Stonyhurst sporting tradition.

Caring for the mental health of our pupils is especially important during this period and one aspect of the support being offered by the College is the “Wellbeing Workout”, created by Mrs Murphy, our Head of Psychology and PSHE. There are weekly tasks designed to sustain a positive mindset in challenging circumstances and Line points on offer for each completed task.

The Combined Cadet Force and Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme have both moved online and Lieutenant Colonel Barber, RSM Clare and Lieutenant Wilmore have demonstrated the adaptability synonymous with military life to ensure the spirit of the Corps remains strong in this period.

The Chaplaincy continues to provide a range of opportunities both to continue the spiritual formation of pupils but also provide help and support to the most vulnerable in this time (see page 9).

This week will also see the Chemistry Olympiad take place, with four of our best chemists entering and hoping to secure awards.

Weekly performances from our Music Scholars and Drama Scholars continue (see page 6), serving as a reminder of the talent we hope to see restored on stage in the near future, and in the weeks ahead, there will be further talks, competitions and virtual events taking place so that pupils can make the most of the Stonyhurst Anywhere experience.

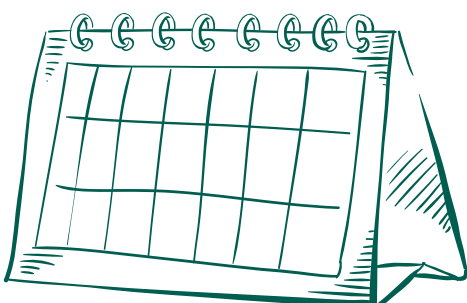
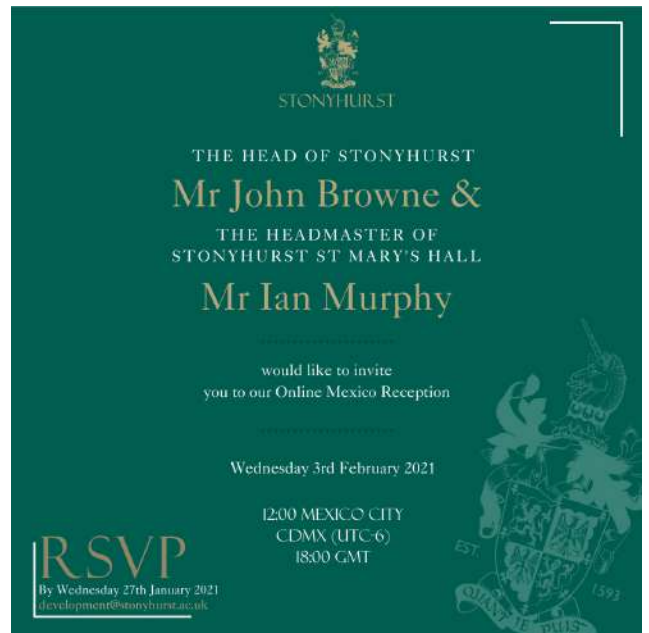


## Virtual Events

## Chaplaincy Co-curriculars Continue!

Despite moving online, Chaplaincy co-curriculars continue to provide opportunities for Catechesis and social justice work across all Playrooms.

Our Confirmation group met this week to continue their formation course, focusing on the theme of Salvation History.

Our Faith in Action Bronze group have embarked on a new project to make Easter-themed Retreat activities for young people to use this April.

We have an exciting new link with Jesuit schools in Poland, Italy and America. On Tuesday, a group of Syntaxians had their first online meeting with pupils their age in these partner schools. Their first topic of conversation was comparing their experiences of life in lockdown.

More locally, pupils were invited to join a new initiative this week with our partner school in Liverpool, St Vincent's School for young people with sensory impairments. Over the past few months, their pupils have been developing green technology that can be attached to cars to reduce their emissions. Our pupils will now be working with theirs to create a presentation that will be pitched to funding bodies, in the hope that they will support the production of this tech.

Whatever the interests of our pupils, Chaplaincy offers opportunities for everyone and we look forward to seeing all that will be achieved through these co-curriculars in the coming weeks.

# Careers Guidance

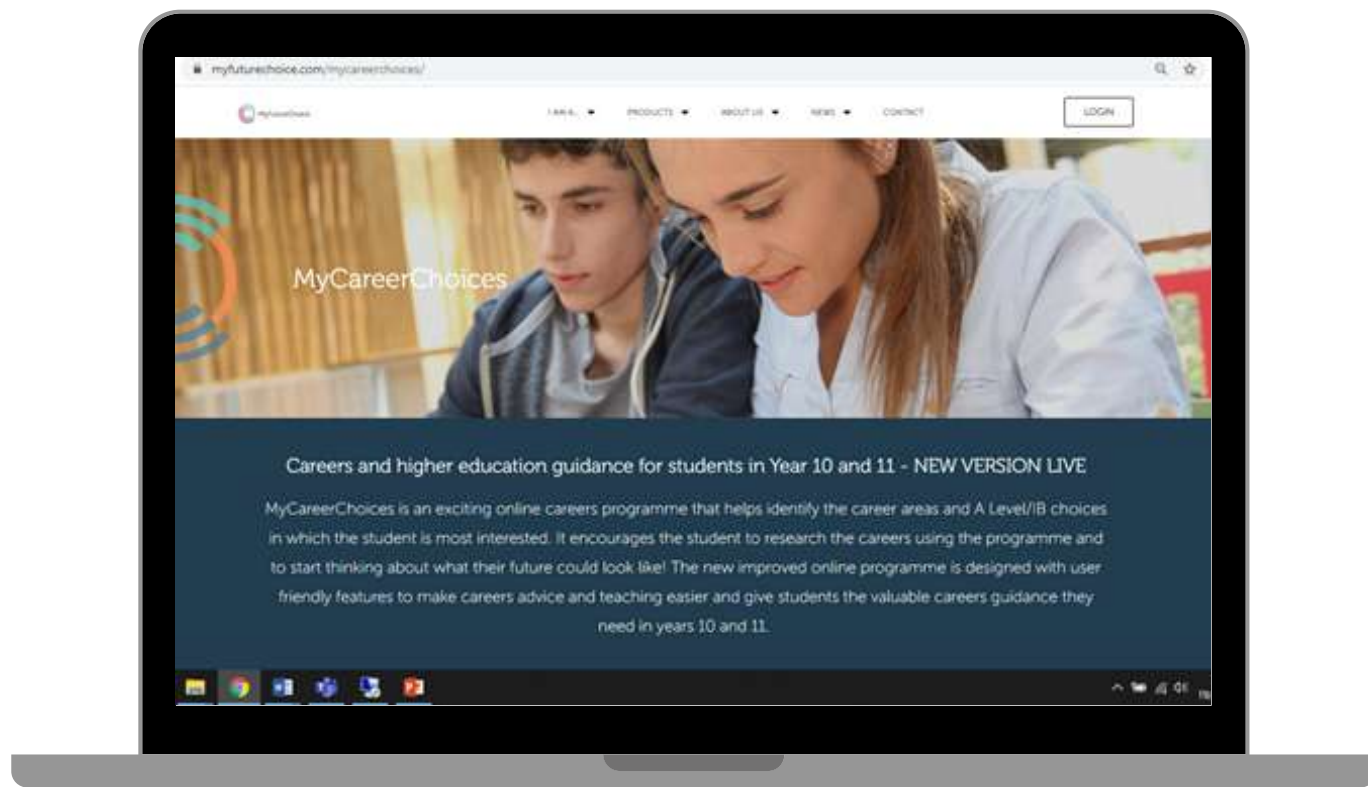
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From Monday to Thursday this week, Syntaxians attended a series of Careers education assemblies every morning as part of their Careers Week. These assemblies were designed to inform pupils about how to fully understand the MyFutureChoice aptitude and interest test results, which most sat before Christmas, and how these link to choosing appropriate careers and Higher Line subjects.

Given that the tests went online for the first time this year, most of the presentations focused on how pupils navigate their way around the new MyFutureChoice online results portal, which is designed to enhance their interpretation of results. On Wednesday of Careers Week, pupils attended an International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme (IBCP) assembly, to follow on from the Higher Line Option Evening in September, where they were informed about the IBCP course by Mrs. Ashe, the IBCP Co-ordinator.

Between now and half-term, all Syntaxians will have an individual Teams interview with Careers/Higher Line staff in order to discuss their plans for study beyond Syntax. This includes the opportunity to discuss potential subject choices for A Level, IB and IBCP. Syntax Parents' Weekend on February 6th is another opportunity to discuss future subject choices with your son/daughter's tutor and subject teachers.

# Object of the Week

The American Military Pocket Atlas, printed by Robert Sayer and Richard Bennett  
1776

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As we watch the historic inauguration of the 46th President of the United States, Joe Biden, it seems appropriate to take an in-depth look at a rare British American map from the Arundell Library.

The Sayer and Bennet collection of maps was produced in 1776 for use in the American Revolutionary War, which had broken out in the previous year.

This particular map was inspired by the publication of an earlier chart, made at the suggestion of British Crown Governor in America, Thomas Pownall. Pownall was born in England and served the British Crown in America from 1753 until 1760, when he returned to England where he became an MP.

Pownall was renowned in the American colonies for his rational and sensitive approach to the difficulties of governing a colony thousands of miles from Britain, stating that 'a governor must lead those people for he cannot drive them.' He became a close friend of Benjamin Franklin, the leading American revolutionary, who frequently visited Pownall in England in the years after the Revolution. In 1770 he argued vehemently in Westminster against the controversial tax on tea in the colonies, saying that it would prove to be a millstone for English necks. Hostilities between American revolutionaries and British Crown forces broke out in 1775 and intensified after July 4th 1776 when the Declaration of American Independence was signed. The war lasted until the peace of 1783 with Britain ceding independence to their former colony.

The maps in this album were published in 1776 for the use of British officers serving in America. Designed to be used in the field of battle, it included the "maps that the British high command regarded as providing essential topographical information in the most convenient form...Surveys and Topographical Charts being fit only for a Library, such maps as an Officer may take with him into the Field have been much wanted. The following Collection forms a Portable Atlas of North America, calculated in its Bulk and Price to suit the Pockets of Officers of all Ranks". Although intended to fit into a pocket, it was usually carried in a holster; thus its nickname of the Holster Atlas.

This album came to Stonyhurst with Lord Arundell's library in the 1830s.
